GUIDELINES FOR THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE SYLLABUS IN

M.A. POLITICAL SCIENCE (CCSS)

(w.e.f. 2019 Admission)

The syllabus revision for the M.A. Political Science (CCSS) is being undertaken with the objectives of upgrading the knowledge levels of the students that they have attained in their under-graduate classes. They are enabled to develop the faculty of critical analysis of their knowledge on the basis of methodological tools that they acquire. It is also intended to help them tackle any form of tests for starting a career as well as for further advanced studies. The under-graduate syllabus is chosen as the information base for further study, and hence, as far as possible the Scheme and Courses chosen for under-graduate syllabus has not been repeated. New courses in emerging areas have been included to facilitate investigations into frontier areas.

Students in the M.A. programme are required to take 16 courses + Project work and Viva Voce over a four Semester period. The core courses (12) are defined around four broad areas: (1) Political Theory (2) Government and Political Process in India (3) Comparative Politics and International Relations and (4) Human Rights. Besides the core courses, students have to select 4 Elective courses, one each in Second and Third Semesters and Two in the Fourth Semester. The credit requirement for award of M.A. Degree as prescribed by the University Regulations is 72. Students are also expected to do 1 Audit course of 2 Credits each in 1st and 2nd Semesters.

Eligibility

Under Mark System: B A Degree in Political Science (Main), or any other Degree with at least one Main paper (B A Public Administration or B A West Asian Studies) or Complimentary/ Subsidiary paper in Political Science with 45% marks. OBC/OEC candidates are eligible to relaxation up to 5%. SC/ST candidates need only to get a pass.

Under Grading System: B A Degree in Political Science (Main), or any other Degree with at least one Core course (B A Public Administration or B A West Asian Studies) or Complimentary course in Political Science (Complimentary Courses: Political Science, Indian Constitution and Politics, International Relations & Organisations and Public Administration) with overall CGPA equivalent to 50%. OBC/OEC candidates are eligible to relaxation up to 5%. SC/ST candidates need only to get a pass. Rank list shall be prepared on the basis of 50% of Entrance Examination and 50% of the total Marks/ Grade of the Degree examination.

Assessment

Total score of a course is 100 and is apportioned in the ratio 20:80 between Continuous Evaluation (CE) and End Semester Examination (ESE). CE consists of four components: Attendance (3%); Mid Semester Examination (8%); Seminar (5%) and Viva Voce (4%). In the matter of attendance 75% is compulsory for appearing for the End Semester Examination.

Mid Semester Examination (30 minutes duration) is in the form of Short Essay questions in which two out of four questions are to be answered, each in about 150 words. Each student has also to make a seminar presentation for about twenty minutes on a topic assigned by the teacher. For each course, there is Viva Voce at the end of the Semester. End Semester Examination (3 hour duration) consists of two types of questions – Short answer questions (8 x 5 = 40 marks) in which the candidate has to answer any eight questions out of twelve, each in about 150 words and essay questions (2 x 20 = 40 marks) in which two questions need to be answered out of four each in about 500 words.



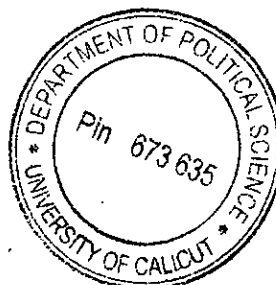

Title of the Course: FIELD SURVEY AND DATA ANALYSIS


Objective:

This course aims to develop a strong understanding on conducting survey and analyzing the data through field based activities which would certainly increase the professional competency of a Political Science student. The student would undergo through different stages of effective conduct of a social science survey includes planning, defining the main objectives of the survey, setting the frame of the survey, sample design and drawing the sample, designing the statistical form, data collection and processing, use of tools and techniques of data analysis etc.

The major aim of the course is to give training to a student on following aspects:

Design a survey, Collection of survey data, analysis of survey results, interpret data from a survey, analyze survey data, methods of data analysis, survey results calculation, write an analysis of data, analysis of quantitative and qualitative survey data etc.

The entire course is designed as a field based one. Students are divided into different groups and conduct a field survey to collect data on a particular theme. Then a report is prepared after analyzing the data collected through survey. During the process the student will be trained on various aspects of field based research and data collection, data analysis and report writing.



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
